HIRANI Launches All-Island Medtech Initiative Report

The 'Buying All-Island in Healthcare – North and South' report publishes the findings and recommendations framework of the All-Island Medtech SMEs (AIMS) initiative.

38 stakeholder groups from health, industry, policy, state agency, academia and procurement, identified common challenges to SMEs and start-ups within the health market. New and smaller suppliers below certain revenue thresholds are not equally positioned to compete with established vendors for healthcare tenders, unfairly affected by scale and liquidity requirements. Outdated assessments for software products, lack of innovation procurement and funding for its mechanisms, limited use of dynamic purchasing systems and purchasing standards that vary widely across secondary care sites are also perceived to be prohibitive.

AIMS stakeholder workshops and expert advisory group sessions recommended the proposed solutions contained in the 'AIMS Framework of recommendations for Innovation Procurement'. The framework focuses on four key areas to deliver system-wide impact that will facilitate the procurement of innovative products across the healthcare sector on the island of Ireland from all vendors, regardless of size –

1. Budget and Mechanisms – create a protected healthcare budget for the procurement of innovation, implement EU approved mechanism

To boost innovation procurement allocate a portion of the public budget, replicating successful European exemplars. Public Procurement of Innovative solutions (PPI) is one mechanism. The public sector uses its purchasing power to act as early adopter of innovative solutions that are not yet available on large-scale commercial basis. PPI can target specific healthcare challenges by seeking innovative solutions, and through a testing phase, reduce risks commonly associated with smaller vendors.

2. Review and revise procurement thresholds — hardware vs software

Tender requirements often demand high turnovers, a relic of old hardware focussed companies. This excludes smaller, innovative firms. Unlike hardware, software does not rely on costly supply chains; its main costs are licenses and setup. Software procurement should prioritise features, capabilities, and fit with needs over financial size.

3. Increase use of Dynamic Purchasing Systems (DPS) in healthcare procurement

A DPS is a digital tool allowing qualified suppliers to join anytime to compete for contracts. In contrast to tender frameworks, which usually last four years. DPS increases small businesses access to public contracts, simplifying the process by cutting out repetitive bids.

4. Co-develop and publish education tool for SMEs navigating HSC and HSE


Developing an educational tool with HSCNI and HSE procurement for SMEs and start-ups will benefit small entities understanding of a multi-faceted complex process. The online tool will be co-developed, user-friendly, accessible and regularly updated to reflect any changes in regulations or best practice.











HIRANI and the NHS Clinical Entrepreneur programme (CEP)

The Clinical Entrepreneur Programme is an NHS initiative, delivered by Anglia Ruskin University and led by Professor Tony Young OBE and team. It is the biggest entrepreneurial workforce development programme of its kind. Launched in 2016, the programme is open to both clinical and non-clinical NHS staff.

The aims of the programme are to:

Allow entrepreneurs and creative thinkers to pursue their innovation without having to leave the health service.

Support the healthcare workforce to develop and scale their most innovative ideas for the benefit of patients, staff and the wider NHS.

Develop the skills, knowledge and experience needed to successfully develop and spread innovative solutions

to the challenges facing the NHS.

Provide a wider benefit to economic growth through inward investment in the health, social care and life science sectors.

The CEP was launched in NI in 2022, championed and run by HIRANI, funded by InvestNI, working in partnership with the Clinical Entrepreneur Team in NHS England.

Alexander Davey is an anaesthetist by training and an ED doctor who has developed a digital platform called eFluidChart. It improves patient care by optimising three key pillars of intravenous fluid management.



Rawa Lina Jawad is an experienced dental associate who is also the Director of Medicube health Ltd.



Michael Quinn is a Consultant Nephrologist who created Round Safely using video and voice technologies to accelerate new ways of communicating between clinicians, patients and their relatives.



Peter Cosgrove is a Consultant Physician in Paediatric Emergency medicine his idea is evolving around how to improve this collaboration between patients/parents and key stakeholders of the healthcare system.



Frances Duffy is Consultant Clinical Psychologist and founder of 6D Dementia. 6D Dementia was one of only 24 successful projects selected worldwide in the inaugural round of the Longitude Prize for Dementia.



Patrick Stirling is a GP and has a long history of innovation within both the digital and HSC realms with involvement in a number of successful projects such as New Models of Prescribing, GPNI.co.uk and ongoing work with the Primary care GP Intelligence platform (GPIP).



Sinead Welsh is a Social Worker and International Child Protection Specialist who developed the Informed Minds app and is now an international safe guarding consultant.



Luke Ward is the Chief Medical Officer with Eolas Medical, a Belfast based software company that aims to give healthcare workers access to important operational information at the point of care.



Richard Mayne is a GP who set up The Moving Medic to help desk-based workers to be less sedentary and more physically active.



Phil McElnay is the CEO at MedAll - an organisation on a mission to make great healthcare training more accessible to millions of global healthcare professionals.



Charlotte Quinn is a Registered Nurse in coronary care and cardiovascular specialist practice who has developed MyStatus.uk to provide people with the opportunity to assess their own health status using evidence-based research and statistics with research-based strategies to improve their health outcomes.



Dr Tufayl Hannan - Tufayl, the co-founder of Gnashers, is leading a sustainable oral care revolution. Gnashers' flagship product, a sustainable oral care subscription box containing toothpaste and mouthwash in tablet form, marks just the beginning of their innovation journey.



Murali Shyamsundar is a research active respiratory/ critical care consultant engaged in developing smart clinical decision alert tools underpinned by innovative AI technology to demonstrate real world impact of the effective data usage that will benefit patients in critical care settings worldwide.



Dr Owen Jefferies - Owen is an anaesthetics registrar currently working to develop an application that makes the hiring of locum doctors more efficient while streamlining the onboarding process for employment to seamless sharing of staff between hospital trusts and reduce reliance on agencies.



Dr Andrew Cupples - I plan to design and implement a core curriculum for Point of Care Ultrasound (POCUS) in Primary Care in NI, working with local secondary care and European primary care colleagues, and design a training programme for GPs and GP trainees, working with industry to have it rolled out.



Dr Ernest Lau - Dr Lau is a consultant cardiologist specialising in heart rhythm disturbances working to ensure implanted heart rhythm management devices are easy to remove years after insertion as well as protect them from infection while they are in use.



Dr Aisling Diamond is a consultant in emergency medicine in a district general hospital and the trauma centre. Currently she works as the deputy medical director with portfolio for workforce and training and as a consultant in emergency medicine.
